Passion leads to progress.



On behalf of the Board, please accept my gratitude for your generous support all these years. We hope that together, our motivation and passion will light the way to make even more progress possible.



PROJECT REPORT

On behalf of the Ryan's Well Foundation Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) team for 2023/2024, I am pleased to report that all our Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) projects for the fiscal year were successfully completed on time and within budget. Special thanks to our generous donors, volunteers, staff and partners worldwide for their invaluable contributions. Our 2023/2024 M&E exercise covered a total of 90 water projects, 2 genderand disability-inclusive improved pit latrines, and 2 rainwater harvesting tanks, benefiting 105,905 people across two African countries: Ghana and Uganda.

Our Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) exercise took place from late January to mid-February 2024, beginning in Ghana's Ashanti Region, where our partners, Dawn of the New Age (DONA), implemented WASH projects. The assessment highlighted the significant water stress in the region. The key beneficiaries of these projects included schools, communities, and maternal and pediatric health centers.

A striking finding was that, in some cases, patients were previously required to bring their own water for medical procedures. Thanks to the implemented WASH projects, this issue has now been resolved in the affected communities.

In Eastern Africa, our Northern Uganda partner, DivineAID, successfully completed 13 water projects in areas previously affected by rebel activities. Beneficiaries were selected through a needs assessment process. A notable innovation was the construction of brick wall fences around water sources, in line with new World Health Organization (WHO) guidelines for safety and sanitation. This shift from wooden to brick fence is recommended by WHO for its cost-effectiveness and environmental benefits. Meanwhile, in Western Uganda, we monitored 57 projects across three districts, observing high-quality work in communities and schools. Despite our efforts, many communities still rely on unprotected water sources due to low clean water coverage in these rural areas, highlighting the need for expanded outreach.





PROJECT CHALLENGES

In recent years, our partners have encountered logistical challenges leading to project delays, cost ineffectiveness and hence inefficiency. During our M&E exercise, Ryan and I had a chance to discuss in detail and in person some of these operational challenges. For instance, RWIDF had frequent mechanical breakdowns of their construction material delivery tipper truck, while DONA and DivineAID struggling with ever increasing costs of drilling in addition to delays associated with hiring drilling rigs. To address these issues, solutions aimed at improving operational efficiency and effectiveness are being sought. These improvements will not only streamline our work but also expand our scope, reduce project costs, and enable support to peer NGOs by providing easier access to services such as drilling and transportation.

As a result of these successful initiatives, our WASH projects yielded significant benefits as testified by benefiting and neighbouring communities during the M&E exercise.

Water has been recognized as a catalyst for peace and development rather than a source of conflict. This was particularly evident in Northern Uganda, a region previously devastated by LRA rebel activities. A poignant example of the impact of our work comes from the Ashanti region, where Aisha, a Nsuo Akyi community member, shared her tragic story. Before the installation of a borehole in her community, her daughter drowned while struggling to access water from a single overcrowded source. The new borehole has since transformed the community, provided safe and reliable water access, and lowered the risk of such tragedies.


Of note:

- There has been a noticeable decline in waterborne diseases within the beneficiary communities.
- Access to safe water and improved sanitation facilities has led to rising school enrollment rates, particularly among girls.
- Women and girls now have more time to invest in their personal and professional growth, no longer burdened by the daily struggle for water.

The 2023/2024 projects not only fulfilled their objectives but have also created a lasting positive impact on the beneficiary communities. The multiplier effect of these benefits continues to contribute to the overall development and well-being of the regions we serve.

SCHOOL CHALLENGE

The 2023/2024 School Challenge helped three primary schools in Western Uganda. Donations totalling over \$8K from 34 schools in 7 countries helped more than 1900 people.



Kafuka Primary School in Rukungiri district and its 164 students and teachers received a 4-stance lined Ventilated improved Pit (VIP) latrine.




Kitoojo Village in Ntungamo district and its 1270 students and teachers received a 30K rainwater harvesting tank.




Nyakishwojwa Primary School is in Rwanyabujana village, Mitooma district; its 550 students and teachers received a 30K litre rainwater harvesting tank.









FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

FUNDS DISTRIBUTION





This year, 87.5 cents of every donation dollar spent has directly supported our charitable programs (Build - Educate - Motivate). As we continue to examine ways to grow and diversify our revenue stream, we are deeply committed to ensuring donations are directed towards our mission of improving lives and effecting change in the world. Our small and efficient team is critical to keeping our overall fundraising costs at 3.1%, and our average administration costs remain nearly unchanged over the past four years at 9.4%. The Foundation's fiscal year runs from April 1st to March 31st. Our annual audit and financial statements were completed this year (2024) by the firm of Hendry Warren LLP. This audit can be found under 2023-2024 Audited Financial Statements on the Ryan's Well Foundation website at www.ryanswell.ca.

FUNDRAISING: Internal fundraising efforts within Ryan's Well Foundation maximize our donor reach and potential impact (i.e., printing costs to mail our annual general reports and newsletters).

ADMINISTRATION: We strive to keep our Administrative fees as low as possible to ensure that funds go towards our charitable programs.

BUILD: Build clean water, sanitation, and hygiene projects, facilitate the accompanying WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene) training, and monitor the project upon completion to evaluate the level of sustainability.

EDUCATE: Educate on the importance of access to safe water and sanitation to raise awareness about the global water crisis. Includes the Foundation's conference and travel expenses.

MOTIVATE: Motivate people, especially youth, to get involved with their passions and make a positive difference in the world. Includes the Foundation's travel expenses to schools and other groups locally and internationally.
